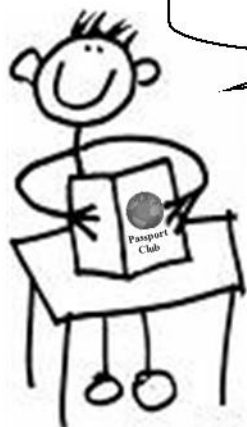


HOW CAN YOU EARN A SPECIAL ITINERARY STAMP?



Below are just a few suggestions for geography-related projects that can be adapted to any student's age and Passport Club Level. To complete Level 5, a student must earn a total of 10 Special Itinerary stamps throughout the 9 months of Passport Club. Extensive projects may count for more than one stamp. Students of all levels are encouraged to choose some project to try!

To receive Special Itinerary stamps on Passport Club Check day, students must bring to the Special Itinerary table either (a) their project(s), or (b) a class presentation form signed by the teacher (blank forms available at the Passport Club display in the Library).

A new **Special Itinerary** project is available every month that has questions featuring the country highlighted on the Passport Club bulletin board in the gym. All the answers can be found from the information displayed on the board. Just print out the blank Special Itinerary from the PTA website!



Memorize Geography Facts

- Learn and locate all states and their capitals within any one of the five regions of the U.S.
- Learn and locate the ten provinces and three territories of Canada.
- Learn and locate the six states and two territories of Australia.

Create a Poster: Choose a country and use books, the internet, maps etc to make a poster with country information, drawings and photos. Some ideas: the flag, foods, people, land and climate, currency or famous landmarks of the country.

Share a Report

- Bring a newspaper article about a country from that month and explain it.
- Write a report on a country, or some aspect of a group of countries.

Give a Class Presentation

- Bring in a costume from a foreign country, discuss and display it.
- Serve a foreign food to the class.
- Set up a speaker or slide show for your class about a foreign country.

Make a Map or Model

- Draw a world or U.S. map on any topic, such as population, climate, or train routes.
- Create a plaster map showing mountains, valleys, rivers, or other features. You choose the area.
- Build a model of a region or structure, such as the Brazilian rain forest, the African savannah, or the Egyptian pyramids. You could use styrofoam, craft sticks, felt, cardboard, paints...
